WA Conference 2015

"Unlocking Bible Prophecy" – WA Spiritual Camp and Prophecy Seminar 25-29 September 2015



Early this year plans were formulated to run a prophecy outreach seminar in conjunction with the WA field Spiritual Conference. The WA Field Bible worker, Brother Luke Kneebone, began at once to organise and prepare the program for this great event. As choir leader, I began to prepare songs that the choir could sing for this special outreach. After offering everybody the opportunity in both Guildford and Stratham churches to join the choir, we finally met for our first practice on Sabbath afternoon the 28th of February. To my surprise approximately 30 people chose to commit to the seven months of practice leading up to the outreach. Over the months to follow the choir worked on a number of various inspirational hymn arrangements such as "How Great Thou Art", "For the Beauty of the Earth" and "The Love of God". Everyone loved the singing, despite the challenges involved in learning their individual parts.

Meanwhile, Br Luke Kneebone and Br Gerson Robles worked together in the preparation of specific topics to be covered throughout the seminar. A lot of time and effort was put into advertising, including the production of a DVD talking about historical facts and fulfilment of Bible prophecy, entitled "The Final Call". This was designed to inspire an interest amongst the people for the upcoming outreach and to gain more contacts to visit and study with in the future. A total of 60 people requested this DVD, which Br Luke and other helpers were able to deliver to each person individually along with invitations to the prophecy seminar.

Finally after seven months of hard work, dedication and even some stressful moments, the plans for the camp and outreach seminar had come together in what Br Luke described as a miracle.



Camp opened with the first seminar topic by Br Gerson Robles on Friday night 25th of September at 7:30pm. In this study Br Gerson examined Nebuchadnezzar's dream in Daniel chapter 2, where he gave focus to future kingdoms that would arise and eventually of a global kingdom that will consume all others, namely, Christ's second coming. There were a number of visitors from the public, and the inspirational music from the choir helped to give power to the message presented.

Sabbath morning we were all refreshed, and the blessing of study and fellowship with like believers from near and far was something enjoyed by all. Brother Paul Chapman, the president of the AUC, was visiting and gave a meaningful message for the divine service on Daniel chapter 4 and how God is the one who gives people position and authority. After some delightful food from the cooks we enjoyed an interesting youth meeting taken by Sister Catherine Robles, entitled "When is it ok to break the rules?"

The outreach for the public began again at 5pm with Br Gerson speaking on "Who is the man of sin?" expanding on the significance of the papacy in connection with God's people and how this affects us today.

Br Luke took the next meeting on the 2300 day prophecy and Christ's mission to the world in his first coming. The choir continued to praise the Lord at the beginning and the end of each meeting throughout the seminar, instilling the impression of the messages in people's hearts and minds (A DVD recording of all the choir songs will be available shortly).

Brother Chapman presented a number of important studies on righteousness by faith and Daniel chapter 11 over Sunday and Monday mornings, which were appreciated by all those in attendance. Sunday night Br Gerson presented some interesting insight about religious freedom in connection with America and prophecy of the lamblike characteristics of this nation drastically changing to the resemblance of a dragon. The following meeting presented by Br Luke was entitled "The Final Call". This meeting described the climax of the great controversy to be faced regarding worship and God's most solemn warning ever given to humanity in Revelation 14:6-12.



All too soon it was Monday morning and the final day of camp. We had been enjoying a lot of delightful and mouth-watering food which proceeded from the kitchen. Brethren John Lausevic and Jacques Payet were the chief cooks along with the Payet family; they had sacrificed their time and effort to prepare healthful and tasty dishes throughout the camp. Many thanks to all the cooks and helpers for their hard work!

Brother Luke concluded the outreach seminar with the final two messages presented on Monday night, focusing on what Christ said about his second coming and his warning regarding false Christs. He also talked about signs that would take place before his return. In his final meeting Br Luke encouraged the people to prepare themselves individually for this great event and accept Christ into their lives as their personal Saviour. He reminded them again of God's great love for us and his personal interest in our salvation.

We believe that God blessed abundantly and that people were led to a greater knowledge and understanding of prophecy and God's will for them. We thank God for his leading and help throughout the camp and outreach. Please pray for the souls that attended this seminar that they might continue to follow the light of God's truth.

22nd General Conference Spiritual Public Meetings

Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement 22nd General Conference Public Spiritual Meetings 10-13 September 2015



A large company of the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement members and friends had the privilege to meet together for the 22nd General Conference spiritual meetings, which took place in Roanoke Virginia during 10-13 September 2015. What a grand time it was when over 1000 believers raised their voices together in song worshiping our heavenly Father.

The theme of the 22nd General Conference Spiritual Public Meetings was, **"Christ is all, and in all"**. A special theme song was composed and written for the occasion by Brother Nathan Tyler.



It was wonderful to know that a number of our Australian members and friends were able to be present at that special occasion. I asked some of them if they would like to relate some of their experiences during the General Conference and their travels; some of them answered, and I would like to share these with you:

"The General Conference spiritual meetings began on Thursday evening. They were held in, the huge auditorium at Salem Civic Center—an impressive venue on its own, but made beautiful by the stage design and lighting put together especially for our meetings.

I walked in, and the first thing that caught my attention were the cameras and computers at work capturing and maintaining a live video stream over the Internet. There were many people I knew there working hard along with some new faces. On the second level, on a small alcove overlooking the whole place, there was another camera set up where Bro Bobby and Sis Junee hosted the live broadcast audience. Watching them and the video crew made me think I was watching a news crew. I was so glad we were doing something so professional.



The front stage was beautifully decorated, and the large screens helped remind me what a huge event this was, probably one of the biggest our church in North America has ever hosted. Many different people were involved on stage, from playing or leading out in the music to the actual messages. The first evening touched my heart when Bro Silva mentioned how Jesus prays for us. As I thought of my own struggles it was a comfort to know Jesus cares so much.

One thing that stood out to me was, even though this was a huge event, it felt like everyone was family. There were so many familiar faces that were so overjoyed to see one another again. I felt blessed as I felt this oneness with so many and how God is leading us all. The sad part was that, because of the large numbers in attendance, as I sat on the upper stands, many times I would see a familiar face and long to catch up—but that fleeting glimpse would be the last time I might notice that person. But on the other hand, there were so many rich times of meeting up with different ones and having wonderful heart-to-heart conversations.



The music was rich and beautiful. The choir and orchestra practiced for many days before the event and did a lovely job. I was overjoyed as I heard the words of the theme song, written by my own dear husband, sung by over a thousand people. I knew each line, and the story it told was rich and meaningful. The concert Sabbath evening was lovely with items from different parts of the world. I particularly enjoyed the Russians along with the Halleluiah chorus sung by the choir. I know it must have been good, when I heard my sevenyear-old son tell his aunty she really should have been there to hear the concert—it was worth hearing!

One of my favourite meetings was by Bro. Rolly Dumaguit. He showed many pictures and told the stories from our region of the world. It thrilled my heart as I saw him show and tell stories from around the Pacific, including our own Elim Heights and Schofields. His presentation was packed with lots of interesting details.

There is much to say, but these were some the highlights for me. The meetings were over too soon. But I was left with the feeling that we are a worldwide people who are traversing a pathway together through this world. I pray that we will all be successful in that journey, and that along the way we will be effective lights for Jesus, in whatever corner of the world we might be."



"Christ Is All and in All"

For 22nd SDARM General Conference Session



Dedication - Levi Joseph Gules

Schofields Church Divine Service -5th September 2015



It was the desire of Amy and Benny Gules to have their firstborn son Levi Joseph dedicated to the Lord. It was a wonderful and touching moment as Br. Sas related at the beginning of the service that he was the one who dedicated his granddaughter Amy Angelica to God on the 12th December 1987 and how he feels so grateful to the Lord for being able to do the same now for his greatgrandchild, Levi Joseph Gules.

After the first hymn, prayer, offering and announcements, Br. Sas opened the meeting with the reading of a couple of paragraphs from the pen of inspiration:

"Mothers, hearing and seeing his words and works, desired that their children might come to him to be blessed. On one occasion one mother with her children left their home to find the Saviour. On the way they told others

of their desire; and as they pursued their journey, mother after mother, with their little ones, joined the company, until, when they reached the place where the Saviour was, there was a little army of women and children who sought to reach his side. He was ministering the word to the people, and healing the sick; and when the women made known their errand, the disciples told them that the Master must not be disturbed. But Christ had heard the petition of the mothers, and at once his heart responded to their desire. He said, 'Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of heaven.'" The Review and Herald, January 7, 1909.

"You remember how the mothers brought their children to Jesus, that He might bless them. At first there were only one or two mothers. They were joined by others, and when they reached Jesus, there were quite a number of mothers and children. They were weary and dusty, but oh, so anxious to come into Christ's presence and receive His blessing. Christ had watched these mothers and their little ones all along the way. He heard the disciples forbidding them to come to Him, and He said, 'Suffer the little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not; for of such is the kingdom of heaven.' And He took the children in His arms, close to His great heart of love, and blessed them." Manuscript Releases Volume 3, pp. 53, 54.

The congregation was then invited to stand and together sing the hymn "Lead them my God to Thee". Then Br. Sas proceeded to read a few more statements from the pen of inspiration.

"Fathers and mothers, to you God has entrusted children, and upon you rests a great responsibility, that of patiently and faithfully educating them. To fit your children to become members of the royal family, children of the heavenly King is your first duty. You are responsible to God carefully to educate them, from their earliest years, to be kind and helpful, patient and forbearing." Manuscript Releases, Vol. 7 p. 16. "...Let mothers now lead their children to Christ. Let ministers of the gospel take the little children in their arms, and bless them in the name of Jesus. Let words of tenderest love be spoken to the little ones; for Jesus took the lambs of the flock in his arms, and blessed them." The Review and Herald, March 24, 1896.

Br Sas asked Benny and Amy to come forward and bring Levi to the front for the dedication prayer; he also asked the congregation to rise while they knelt down together. After the prayer, the congregation was asked to be seated.



Divine Service proceeded on the topic of the family. Some of the points expressed were:

The family is the most important unit that exists in this world, and it originated right back at creation.

To have a house is not to have a home, but we can have both; a house and a home. Whatever trials we've had in the past, if we surrender and submit ourselves to God, He can change the family; and the home will be as it was in the beginning, a bliss!

To close, Br Sas referred to the message in Malachi 4:6 "And he shall turn the heart of the fathers to the children, and the heart of the children to their fathers..." there will be a restoration of the family; when the hearts of the parents are united together and then united to their children, and Christ is in the centre, it will be a strong family "...and a threefold cord is not quickly broken." Ecclesiastes 4:12, last part.

The hymn "There Is Beauty All Around" was sung, and the final prayer was offered.

May God's blessings be upon each family who chooses to have Jesus as their nucleus.

"Dear SDARM representatives,

I shared your post about the interview with a young man named Jaime from Australia at the 2015 GC session and wrote the following comments about the SDARM church in the post. I thought it would only be fair to share the thoughts with you all as well, so that you have a chance to see a review coming from someone who has no history of being acquainted with this organization (myself). Thanks and God bless!

"Notice this young man's smile... it's is an amazing phenomenon that you see this beautiful smile over and over with the people of the SDARM church. I'm starting to call it the "SDARM smile." Recently I have been attending the SDARM, which is basically the same as the SDA church but has remained very faithful to the original message of truth since the original European group was disfellowshipped from the SDA church not long after the turn of the century because they wanted to remain faithful to our message about military combat (conscientious objector status).

This seems to be a church full of moderate, happy, friendly people who follow the SDA teachings without moral compromise. They are not extremist, "off-shoot" or cult-like in any way (in contrast to almost all other groups that have left SDA church). This seems to be a world-wide body of people unified in purpose – there are no obvious extremes of liberal or conservative ideology warring against each other. In their services they always have a handshake line coming out of the sanctuary – if there are 20 people who came that day you will shake nearly 20 hands – if there are 100 people there you will shake nearly 100 hands (lots of hugging going on with that too, actually), such as with the area conferences they have several times a year. The churches are small but area churches communicate and get together for activities, share speakers back and forth and seem to know each other. They have a very active and interesting youth program with meetings that get kids involved. The kids and children themselves are very active and friendly – and have greeted me repeatedly and openly befriended me from the time I walked in the door, even though I'm much older than they are!

While I believe that there are many sincere SDA members, I feel that somewhere along the way the church has lost touch with the original purpose and begun chasing after the glitter and glamour of the world – and because of this you also have a lack of the Holy Spirit which has been grieved away. SDARM members have not lost the spirit of friendliness- you don't walk out of their churches feeling like no one noticed you. Instead you might get several hugs and handshakes and a lot of new friends, as well as getting to witness many beautiful smiles. It seems evident that the Spirit of God is truly blessing this organization.

I also love the SDA church, but in all honesty I'm getting a little weary of a life-long struggle to try to get people to understand how Christianity could be (moderate, friendly, faithful) instead of either worldliness/liberalism or conservative extremism that seem to be the only two options for SDA services. I have dearly enjoyed the refreshing blessing of becoming involved with a group of people so unified in purpose in following after Christ.

Condolences to the McCutcheon family

Our Condolences go to Brother Geoff McCutcheon and his family on the loss of his dear mother, who passed away in New Zealand at the age of 85.

Brother Geoff is an ordained elder in the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement Australasian Union, who is currently working for the Victoria/Tasmania Conference.

Although, Br Geoff's mother was not of our faith, for part of her life she was a Seventh Day Adventist and instilled very good Christian principles in her children. Brother Geoff values these principles to this day.



Here is a short recollection from Brother Geoff McCutcheon on his mother:

"My Mum, Colleen May Curtin, was born in Napier New Zealand, May 15, 1930. Her parents Andy and Marie Curtin were orchardists in Pakowhai not far from Napier. Through circumstance, she was raised in early childhood at a convent in Wellington and had often commented how kind the nuns were to her. They taught and encouraged her to sing. She had a lovely voice and throughout her life had a love of choral and spiritual music. Mum returned to Napier when she was about 17 and took up an apprenticeship as a hairdresser. Shortly afterward, Mum met and married my father Colin McCutcheon. Dad was raised a Seventh Day Adventist, and Mum accepted the Adventist message.

My parents loved country living. Many years were spent working on farms inland from Napier. Mum was also trained in nursing and worked in intensive care at the Hastings Hospital. They raised seven children.

Mum loved gardening as well as music and was actively involved in Country Women's Institute. Her gardens were always a blaze of colour and open to the public for viewing on occasion. Both parents for a time sadly slipped away from regular church attendance. After many years my parents and younger siblings moved and settled in Taupo. Sadder still, my parents parted company, and after several years Mum remarried and lived on average on the Kaipara Harbour. Although Dad returned to the Adventist faith, Mum did not. She attended Anglican services regularly with my stepfather.


Around 2003 Mum and stepfather moved back to Taupo. She became very involved again with floral art and was President of the Institute for 2-3 years. It was in about 2011 that my stepfather died, and shortly after Mum started to develop dementia. With failing health, Mum was admitted to a rest home towards the end of last year. Her health held for several months. She enjoyed singing for church services held in the rest home, but as dementia rapidly advanced, she lost appetite and weight. Tuesday the 29th of September NZ family informed me she was fading fast. I travelled to be with her the same day, and she passed away peacefully early in the morning of the next day.

My dear Mum is survived by 7 children, 22 grandchildren, and 25 great grandchildren.

My brothers and sisters called upon me to conduct the chapel service and committal. I thank the Lord for strength to do so.

May God comfort their hearts during this time of sorrow.


The funeral took place on Monday, 5th October. Brother Benjamin Burec will be greatly missed by many.

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PNG Drought Relief Appeal

Appeal letter for Funds for Emergency Food Supplies due to El Nino Drought in PNG

Dear Brethren and Friends in Australia and New Zealand,

"God also entrusts men with means. He gives them power to get wealth. He waters the earth with the dews of heaven and with the showers of refreshing rain. He gives the sunlight, which warms the earth, awakening to life the things of nature and causing them to flourish and bear fruit. And He asks for a return of His own." Christ Object Lessons p. 351.



"Our money has not been given us that we might honor and glorify ourselves. As faithful stewards we are to use it for the honor and glory of God. Some think that only a portion of their means is the Lord's. When they have set apart a portion for religious and charitable purposes, they regard the remainder as their own, to be used as they see fit. But in this they mistake. All we possess is the Lord's, and we are accountable to Him for the use we make of it. In the use of every penny, it will be seen whether we love God supremely and our neighbor as ourselves." Christ Object Lessons p. 351.

Currently a need has arisen in Papua New Guinea where our members and their children are going hungry and at this point in time are in great need for assistance. Members cannot access their food sources, namely their gardens, due to frost and drought. Over 10 weeks of no rain has meant that their dependence on the only water source to water their gardens has dried up. In addition the water supplies from streams and rivers have given up. In some places springs have dried up. The PNG Welfare Department has used up all available funds, and the government is not forthcoming in aid to the people in a timely manner. Across the country many people are in need. Currently the immediate need is to purchase food supplies for all the member families in need. Funds are needed for this purpose. Please donate generously for this important need as without a water supply, the burden to collect water almost always falls on children. With many thousands of people without water, that's a huge risk to children's health. They are at serious risk of diarrhoea, and other life-threatening illnesses from drinking contaminated water sources.

Our Plan is to subsidize their food costs to alleviate the loss of their only source of food; their gardens. The plan is to purchase supplemental food supplies for a period of four months. Once this period of time has passed, we will assess the situation on the ground through the PNG Welfare Department and bring further news.

"Money has great value, because it can do great good. In the hands of God's children it is food for the hungry, drink for the thirsty, and clothing for the naked. It is a defense for the oppressed, and a means of help to the sick. But money is of no more value than sand, only as it is put to use in providing for the necessities of life, in blessing others, and advancing the cause of Christ.

But Christ sanctions no lavish or careless use of means. His lesson in economy, 'Gather up the fragments that remain, that nothing be lost,' is for all His followers. (John 6:12.) He who realizes that his money is a talent from God will use it economically, and will feel it a duty to save that he may give." Christ Object Lessons p. 352.

"The more means we expend in display and self-indulgence, the less we can have to feed the hungry and clothe the naked. Every penny used unnecessarily deprives the spender of a precious opportunity of doing good. It is robbing God of the honor and glory which should flow back to Him through the improvement of His entrusted talents." Christ Object Lessons p. 352.
