New Zealand Camp 2016

EPWORTH CAMP, HORA HORA, NZ

APRIL 24 - MAY 1, 2016

The theme for this camp was 'Making Eternity a Priority', vitally important to all of us in these last days. We looked forward to the presentations on 'The King is coming', 'What are you doing with your life?', 'A life-changing experience', 'Redirecting your life', 'Preparing for Heaven', 'Opening the heart to Jesus', and 'Reprioritising'.



Sunday, 24 April

This was a busy day – my husband William and I set off for the Avondale Produce Market with Sis Richel Pedrosa at the bright hour of 7.30am, armed with a huge list. We visited many interesting stalls, where we tasted and conferred on the best vegetables and fruits, not

to mention freshly-made tofu! The rain descended but didn't deter the volume of people trundling through with their bags and trollies. Many trips later to the vehicle we headed back to the New Lynn Church. Later in the evening we picked up Bro Paul Chapman, then later Jared and Angellicar (Gee-ann) and their four-year-old son Stephen Kyle from Auckland Airport. Kyle found a special friend, William, who tried rocking the jet-lagged little boy to sleep, to no avail...

Monday, 25 April

Off to camp. Our motor-home became the camp trailer, with every available inch taken up with camp produce. William and I arrived at 3pm; the others soon followed. Epworth Camp is in beautiful surrounds; the grounds border on the headwaters of Lake Karapiro, with huge old oak trees and a walnut, displaying their autumn colours. Lake Karapiro was formed in 1947 by damming the Waikato River to store water for the Karapiro hydroelectric power station. The lake is regarded as one of New Zealand's best rowing venues, where New Zealand Olympic rowers train. The area is a wealthy dairy farming and horse stud district. Nearby Mt Maungatautari (797m) is covered in dense native bush and is a popular view point.



The camp is well set up with many rooms, family lodges, ablution blocks and a well-ordered kitchen with huge walk-in chiller and a massive mixing machine, which was put to good use later! Lots of organization followed: loading the chiller, stocking the pantry and sorting out a late dinner.

Tuesday, 26 April

This day was set aside for the NZ Field Delegation (AGM) Meeting; so others arrived, and those who were not needed there were consigned to cooking duties!

Nonetheless Richel and I were up in the kitchen by 5.30am, followed by William and Jared, to set up breakfast. Jared and Gee-ann were mystified and delighted with all the intriguing flavors of NZ fruit — feijoas, 'kiwis', even dried blueberries--and enjoyed the new season apples and pears! Brother Paul Chapman was of much help during the delegation meeting — a very long day, finishing for the attendees at 6pm. The day flew, as

we also needed to make a run to Cambridge for a simcard for Gee-ann, more groceries, and hats/gloves for the visitors as temperatures were decidedly colder than the Philippines.

After a delicious tofu stir fried lunch and the regular worship held by Brother Arnaldo Pedrosa at 6:00pm, a couple of enjoyable hours were spent making 'sausage rolls' (over 300) to be chilled and cooked as needed. Many hands made light work!

Wednesday, 27 April

Wednesday was set aside for the field board meeting, although it didn't commence until 12:00 noon and finished just after 3:00pm, with dates and events set for the coming year. At 7:00pm Brother Pedrosa spoke on Matthew 7:13 – do we want to walk on the broad way ('all roads lead to Rome') or the strait, narrow way. The hall for meetings was huge; it was cold and echoed, so a decision was made to hold the following meetings in the smaller room adjacent to the kitchen. That night was another late one, making spring rolls

- again, many hands were available to help, all under the watchful eye of Sister Richel. Many unique shapes and sizes of rolls!

Thursday, 28 April

Sister Winsome Latimer took the morning worship, entitled 'Eternity and Life'. Brother Chapman spoke on 'The Latter Rain' with 'Ten Times the Power'. "You are getting the coming of the Lord too far off. I saw the latter rain was coming as suddenly as the midnight cry, and with ten times the power." Spalding & Magan Collection, p. 4:3.

At 7:00pm two cars left to pick up five students from Elim Missionary College, who had flown in to Auckland Airport – lots of laughs in our car, getting to know Guerlyne, Wendy and Lily. Bro Arnaldo and Sister Richel had picked up Serban and Roxanne. By 12:30am we were finally back at camp with tired and cold visitors, but after smelling hot soup and herb bread they decided food was the first priority! Unfortunately, they had not been able to bring bedding, and their first night in NZ was a little chilly as the heaters in the room switched off on the hour...brings to mind **Eccesiastes 4:11** "Again, if two lie together, then they have heat: but how can one be warm alone?"! This was sorted out the next day!

Friday, 29 April

At 9:15am Bro Serban Ionita took the message on 'What is the glory of the Lord?'-- discussing what is the glory (His goodness/character), where can we find the glory, and what do we need to see? (Jesus who gave His all on the cross of Calvary).

Sabbath, 30 April

Brother Jared (Philippines) led morning worship and emphasised if we want to hasten the coming of our Lord, we will make eternity our priority. 'If we would be saints above, let us be saints below.' We need to give ourselves to God and be emptied of self.

Sabbath School was then opened by Sister Richel Pedrosa and Sister Tapetu Wilson, after which Sister Guerlyne reviewed last week's lesson, and Sister Lily led this week's lesson.

The Divine Service was led by Brother Paul Chapman with 2 Corinthians 2:14 in mind – Steps to Christ, p. 68: "Now thanks be unto God, which always causes us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place." Brother Chapman discussed in view of eternity, what should we be doing today? What is this savour? We heard from Steps to Christ, p. 58: "In the matchless gift of His Son, God has encircled the whole world with an atmosphere of grace as real as the air which circulates around the globe." Jesus was the fulfilment of this sweet smelling savour (Ephesians 5:2) God now uses His people to manifest that sweet savour. Like it or not, we have an influence on the person next to us for good or for evil – and the question was, are we imparting to others a sweet savour of Christ? This was most thought-provoking and sobering.



A delicious lunch was shared by all, including visitors for the day. Sister Richel had throughout this camp put much effort into putting at least 50% raw food on the tables – we were blessed to have such healthful food, all of which was obviously enjoyed by all. As explained above, the kitchen boasted a huge mixer which was put to good use, turning out huge amounts of herb pull-apart bread, fruit braids and loaves (William), cinnamon rolls (Adelaide) and a giant banana cake (Corin). Well done, all!



Following lunch, we all walked down to the pool, where we were privileged to witness Brother Eric Wilson make his profession of faith, and was baptised by Brother Pedrosa. Sister Jessie Paddison also wished to be rebaptised, and it was a wonderful occasion, seeing these two dear people braving the cool temperatures to commit themselves to our Lord.

The Young People's Meeting was held, led again by our friends from Elim Missionary College, with a fun time matching up biblical names; then a slideshow where we saw

many interesting and touching pictures of a health mission they had been involved in, in Africa. Sister Corin organised and led a baby photo identifying 'competition' – many lovely old photographs were shown.

The day finished with a time of sharing talents – in song and poetry, with an international theme; many ethnic groups were represented. Over 50 people enjoyed this wonderful Sabbath, and it was great to catch up with old friends.

Sunday, 1 May

Brother Arnaldo Pedrosa led worship in the morning, opening with a story on Jonathan Edwards, the famous revival preacher, and the heritage he left to his 1000 descendants. He discussed our heritage (Acts 7: 2-5 – Abraham had no heritage on earth; Hebrews 11: 15-16 – we too desire a better country). We must dwell as pilgrims and strangers here if we would gain "'a better country, that is, an heavenly.' Patriarchs and Prophets, p. 170. 'Christ communicates the current of spiritual strength to every believer. So long as the soul is united to Christ, there is no danger that it will wither or decay.'" The Desire of Ages, p. 676. God has our names in the books of heaven, engraved on His hands.

We must take hold of that long line of victorious examples in God's word and throughout the ages and claim that wonderful promise: "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be, but we know that, when He shall appear, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. And every man that hath this hope in Him purifieth himself, even as He is pure." 1 John 3:2, 3.

On this wonderful hope camp was closed. Many thanks to all who made this week possible – the speakers, our friends from America, those who looked after the children, those who contributed around the camp in various ways and in the kitchen, with donations, but most of all with their presence and prayers.

Foundations of Manhood - WA Field Men's Camp

May 20-22, 2016

"Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong. Let all your things be done with charity." 1 Corinthians 16:13, 14.

The bush called us, and the men and boys of WA Field gathered together from May 20-22 at a beautiful forest a few kilometres south of Dwellingup. It was muddy, the weather was very cold, and it rained most of the time we were there. A cold front was forecast, and it certainly did come and hit us with wind and



rain, especially at night when our noses and ears were sacrificed to the cold. We even got a little hail. But we loved it. We huddled under a gazebo or around the fire, and we often thawed out during our discussions.

Frozen figures or not, we loved our fellowship, and the conversations on topics relevant to our experience was especially profitable.

The first topic we considered was "Personal Integrity" taken by Chris Newman. This was an excellent start to the camp and valuable lessons were learned. He that is faithful in the least



is also faithful in much – integrity means to adhere to a strict internal code of morals and having the discernment to know the difference between right and wrong. Over and over we arrived to the basic conclusion of how vital it is to have a change of heart through the Spirit of Christ.

The next topic was taken by Manuel Bellina on "The Battle of the Sexes or the Perfect Team". How are we to view the patriarchal system of governance seen in the Scriptures? Are the roles of a man and woman interchangeable? Here we also explored questions such as if complementarianism is Biblical. We also looked at the concept of egalitarianism and discussed a little of the origins and influence of feminism.



Space is too short to comment on each topic but others, including Luke Kneebone, Nathan Tyler (who was visiting us from VIC), and Hayden Wiseman led out in interesting discussions on topics such as, "Commitment to Christ & His Church", "How to Love Our Wives", "What Does It Mean to Lead" and "Moral & Sexual Purity".

On Saturday night, we had alarming news as we found out one of the daughters of Jacques Payet was ill in hospital. We kept praying for Amariah and our hearts were with Jacques and his family as he left us and went to be with her at hospital. We praise God that Amariah is now much better and is at home with her family recovering.

On Sunday morning, a group of us enjoyed a fresh mountain bike ride up and down a 12km bike trail in the mountains not far from our base. It was absolutely beautiful. The challenge was hard but invigorating. Later



that night, we took off four wheel driving in Luke's car. Six of us packed like sardines into a very bumpy ride.

This was the first time we ever had a men's only camp, and it was well worth it. Our wives and little children were very much missed. It will be the women's turn soon, but I hear they are renting a beautiful heated/air-conditioned house. Smart move.

Now I'm 80



Now I'm 80



"Anthocyanins are flavonoids in fruits and vegetables that render them vivid red to blue. It has been suggested that anthocyanins possess anti-inflammatory and anti-carcinogenic activity, cardiovascular disease prevention, obesity control, and diabetes alleviation properties, all of which are more or less associated with their potent antioxidant property."

After the talk, Christine Godfrey, Pat Thiel and Gerson Robles demonstrated their dishes. Baked Tomato and Tofu Entre, French Lentil Soup and Creamy Potato Bites. The food was very delicious and well presented, and we had very positive feedback from our visitors.

After a very interactive adult Sabbath School lesson where we enjoyed discussing on the topic Incarnation of Christ, the Youth Explorer class presented a special praise item entitled, "My Tribute" together with Hayden Wiseman on the violin and Gerson Robles on the guitar. The words to this hymn are absolutely beautiful, and everyone was blessed as we praised the Lord.

During Divine Service, Guildford Church Choir sang two hymns, "For the Beauty of the Earth" and "Wonderful Grace of Jesus". Luke Kneebone then spoke on the subject of "Redemption's Mystery Revealed". Showing how redemption was revealed in symbols, prophecies and object lessons since creation and throughout history, Luke then focused on how the good tidings of salvation were clouded in mystery at the first advent of Jesus and how the Lord did then open up the understanding of the disciples after the resurrection and they were able to see clearly the greatest mystery ever revealed to the human race. The Lord blessed us with a good amount of visitors; and although we should be inviting people to come along each Sabbath, it was good to have a special program just for visitors. We'll definitely do it again.

Amariah's Experience



God is always in control!

"Blessed be the LORD: for he hath shewed me his marvellous kindness in a strong city" – Psalm 31:21. This psalm proclaims a personal truth for me, for God has surely revealed his marvellous kindness in my life! This is what the Lord has done for me.

Just over two months ago I began experiencing severe and seemingly unexplainable abdominal pains. I had experienced similar pains prior, however they were never as prominent or recurring as what I was now experiencing. Due to the nature of the pain, I was frequently in hospital where efforts were taken to try and diagnose the cause. I was finally referred by our family doctor for an ultrasound were I was diagnosed with multiple gallstones. This discovery shocked everyone, including various medical staff, as there was no logical explanation for why I could have them; however, that was the case, and now we needed to focus on what was to be done next. I was in conflict as to whether or not I should use natural remedies or undergo surgery as recommended, as there were a number of various factors involved that I needed to

consider. I immediately changed my diet and decided to have surgery. Looking back at this decision, I praise the Lord for His guidance, as unbeknown to me and other medical staff, my gallbladder had become inflamed and infected.

The next challenge we were to face was finding a surgeon. The Lord knew our situation, and we prayed that He would provide and He did. He provided in such a way that we didn't even need to search for a surgeon. My surgery was scheduled for the 13th of June. This was still quite a wait; however, I knew that it was the earliest surgery I could obtain. I was informed that I would be notified if an earlier operation was made available. During the weeks that followed I experienced a number of severe gallbladder attacks that took me at least one week to recover from each time. This was devastating as I was unable to work, attend university or work on my assignments. At this point I was really praying that God would provide me with an earlier surgery, and He did. Continuously, prayers were being answered! I was now scheduled for surgery on the 20th of May.

The day of my surgery finally came around, and all appeared to go well. However, during the night that followed my surgery, I was experiencing a lot of pain, more than usual for the type of surgery I had. The following morning, I was unable to stand or walk as I was constantly feeling dizzy and fainting. I was then assessed by the medical team at Bentley hospital and was immediately transferred to Fiona Stanley hospital for another emergency operation as I was discovered to be bleeding internally. Again I want to praise the Lord for His dealing in this situation. The day of my operation, I met with a particular nurse for a pre-assessment before entering surgery. The nurse, however, had finished her shift when I came out of surgery, and I did not see her again. I praise God that the following morning this nurse was working again as she was the nurse who suspected that something was very wrong because she had seen me before the operation and could notice the drastic change. I believe that God was working right from the beginning

because had I not seen that nurse earlier or had she not been working the following day, I am at a loss as to what could have happened; things could have been much worse than they already were.

At Fiona Stanley hospital I was assessed and admitted for surgery. This operation was to find and stop the bleeding site and drain all the blood I had already lost. The operation lasted six hours. I lost two litres of blood and needed five blood transfusions to begin recovering safely. The days following were hard and recovery slow. I was suspected of still having some gallstones trapped in one of my ducts and if so would need to have another procedure done to remove them. To determine this, I had an MRI, and I thank God that all was clear! I was eventually released from hospital and resumed recovery at home.

This experience was a scary one, but I know that God saved my life, and I know that He can work good from these circumstances, and He already has. Throughout my recovery I was informed of the many people and churches throughout the world praying for me. I was completely overwhelmed and touched by the support and prayers ascending up to God on my behalf. An experience was shared where some people felt impressed to begin praying for me the day of my operation without actually realising what was happening. Prayer chains were started up in my father's country, Seychelles; prayer groups commenced all through Australia, and even individuals who professed no faith began to pray! This was wondrously amazing; and if this was the outcome of me enduring all that I did, if so many people were brought together in unity and if others began to pray for the first time, then it was all worth it!

Things often happen in life that we cannot explain or that appear so terrible, but the blessing is that God is there to hear us when we call and to help us. God works miracles, and I know that He worked a miracle in my life! Without Him I may not have been here today to share this experience of deliverance with you all, and that is scary. Please remember that no matter what happens, God is there and He always has a plan. We cannot see what lies ahead, but He can, so put your trust and your faith completely in Him and He will deliver!

Letter of Thanks

To those who knew me and prayed, and to those who did not know me and still prayed!

I have been through twenty years of my life and never once did I imagine that something this extreme could have happened to me. I have often felt and prayed for individuals and families who have been through trying circumstances, but neglected to see the reality of the words 'it can happen to anyone'. I believe that we readily get absorbed and caught up in the world around us and the disguised beauties it offers; we continue living as though we still have tomorrow. I cannot express enough the falsity of this claim. We cannot keep living this way. We don't have tomorrow; we only have today, this moment. My experience has really taught me that things can change in the blink of an eye, when we least expect them to, and how important it is that we are ready at any moment.

Words cannot express the depth of my gratitude for all your thoughts and prayers; I have been overwhelmed by all the support. I believe that it is only by the grace of God that I am still here today and want to give praise and thanks to God for His boundless mercy towards me and my family. I want to encourage everyone to continue praying to God, to continue pleading with Him and to continue offering

requests and prayers of thanksgiving; God does hear, and He does answer. My life today is a gift from God and an answer to prayer.

Psalm 20 holds the miracle and promise that I believe was worked in my life through Christ Jesus –

"The LORD hear thee in the day of trouble; the name of the God of Jacob defend thee; Send thee help from the sanctuary, and strengthen thee out of Zion; Remember all thy offerings, and accept thy burnt sacrifice; Selah. We visited Wynwood Nursing Home in Norwood, which turned out to be a converted old house, and we were a little disappointed with the small number of guests (about 8) ready and sitting in the 'Lounge'. We were told that no message had been passed on, otherwise the guests would have been placed in the dining area with a lovely piano to accompany us; nevertheless, the staff told us we were welcome to present without music. I promptly rung



Kaylene, who said Alecia had her violin and that we could sing along with her, so, thank you Alecia; our first 'Acappella' (almost) presentation. We had about 24 singers including 9 children, and so we more than doubled our audience, yet the positive response from the appreciative expressions both from our immediate audience and those looking in from the hallway, helped our hearts to sing along with the 'Lord's Music'. Trevor, one of our leading brethren, had encouraged us to present hymns that would most likely be well-known favourites. This turned out to be a blessing on two accounts. Without knowing it, hymns chosen for the day turned out to be some of our own members most 'touching' hymns, ('Face to Face') so proving that our Lord was in charge of all the proceedings for the day.




