Canvassing Seminar

Our Victorian conference was blessed in the month of October with the visit of Brother Jacob de Souza and his dear family Sister Sandra, Lucas and Isabella. They came and

stayed with us on the weekend of the Sabbath 15th of October when Bro. Jacob shared a message based on Matthew 13:47-51 entitled, "The Net."

This was a powerful message on our need of being fishermen of souls for our Lord Jesus Christ. He also reported guite a significant amount of literature being distributed in South Australia on a weekly basis, a work done by him together with lay volunteers.

The Lord has blessed some areas of the city of Adelaide with literature being scattered like the leaves of autumn. Right after the sermon, some brothers and sisters approached Bro. Jacob and asked him if he could run a program like the one he is doing in SA, here in Victoria. He accepted the challenge.

On the weekend of the 29th and 30th of October, he and his family returned, and this time, he also brought Brother Andrew Willcox along in order to run a canvassing weekend with the theme, "Dare to be a Canvasser." Several presentations challenged everyone to become involved with canvassing work, noting that, "As long as probation continues, there will be opportunity for the canvasser to work." The Colporteur Evangelist, p. 99.

Brother Jacob shared some short video testimonies, and then a video demonstrating two canvassers knocking on doors with different interactions. A sample rejection was will be willing to accept any literature we take to their doors. Another scenario was the acceptance, where a person was ready and willing to receive the messages of health and Bible truth for this time.

On Sunday morning we gathered once again for a practical presentation and some training. A couple of people demonstrated how you would interact with people at the door. Then there was a short Q&A session for a chance to ask questions about the activity we were about to embark on.

On that day, we had 19 adults, 2 teenagers, and 8 children who actively participated in the canvassing work. We spent a couple of hours, in teams of two or three, knocking on doors and talking to people using a community survey with five questions.

After we asked each question, depending on the answer, we gave people an invitation for one or more of several programs, including how to stop smoking, cooking classes, Optimise Your Brain seminar, **Depression Recovery** Program, or free Bible studies by correspondence. We also took their contact details if they wished for us to follow up for a reminder regarding any of the

After those couple of hours canvassing, we gathered back at the church to share experiences and, believe it or not, everyone had really positive experiences! We were just amazed of the results each team had. Blessing after blessing was shared by the participants, and we praised the Lord for giving us this experience. We shared how many gift packages we gave away and how many people acquired health books on a donation basis.

This was our results for the short amount of time we went out on the day:

• Program invitations (to various events): 43

I personally think this is one of the best and simplest ways to do canvassing in Australia—who doesn't want to answer some questions and give their opinion? According to Brother Jacob and Brother

Andrew, 95% of people are willing to answer those questions, and I can tell you that it's true. We have tested it here in Victoria and had a blessed experience!

We are really thankful to the Lord and also would like to thank Brother Jacob and his family, and Brother Andrew, for coming to our field to encourage our people to do this wonderful activity to reach out to people in our community.

We would like to encourage each local church to taste and see that the Lord is good. Here is an inspirational message if you are still wondering if you should do this work in your local church:

"Place in the homes of the people papers, tracts, and books that will preach the gospel in its several lines. There is no time to be lost. Let many give themselves willingly and unselfishly to the canvassing work, and thus help to sound a warning that is greatly needed." Counsels on Health, p. 464.

## **Schofields Church Cooking Classes**

With Covid restrictions finally gone and things opening up to normal again, it was time to put our cooking demonstration hats back on and get in and amongst our community again. We heard regularly from people who had participated in the past, asking us when we would be holding another series. Our last attempt in 2021 had not been possible due to going back into lockdown just before the scheduled dates, but this time with the help of God, we wanted to push through while the opportunity was available, and God surely blessed the cooking demonstrations that were held.

Sr Lidia Voncina and Sr Rosetta Ilic, who have been at the helm of Schofields Church cooking demonstrations for quite a few years, once again were able to pull off a successful series of great vegan recipes with the help of their usual sidekicks who were always on hand for their opinions and advice where needed.

On Monday, 10 October, 2022, we began the evening with a short presentation from Br. A. C. Sas on "Why I am a Vegetarian," where he was able to share some of his personal experiences and spoke about the benefits of being on a vegetarian diet and why meat eating is a big contributor to many health issues in our society. The talk was then followed by the demonstration of very simple recipes such as Simple gluten free buns (so easy and delish), guacamole, a lima bean open pie (a must try, I promise!) and a vegan bread pudding which was thoroughly enjoyed by our audience.



It was a smaller group than usual for our first night, where we saw about 35 people in attendance, including our usual cooking demo attendees and also some new faces.

On the following Monday, 17 October, 2022, Br. Paul Chapman shared a short presentation on "Calcium" and the benefits of plant-based calcium. We learned that calcium from dairy in fact did the total opposite to our



bodies than what it was advertised to do. Indeed in consuming cow's milk we were causing more damage to our bones than good. Calcium through vegetable protein/plant protein was much more beneficial in preventing bone fractures compared to animal protein, and vegetables, nuts and seeds were higher in calcium than cow's milk. After this informative presentation, chefs Lidia Voncina, Rosetta Ilic and Stela Gules got to demonstrating another very tasty menu that consisted of a Red Lentil Tofu (great for stir fries), Green Bean Salad (so. so good!), Plant-based Vegetable Frittata (a big hit!) and a Fruit Sago (so good for a hot summer's day). Again, these were very much enjoyed by all.

The group of attendees on this evening grew a little more, and we had about 45 attendees, which was great to see.

On the last Monday evening of the series, October 24, 2022, Br. Paul Chapman presented a short talk on the importance of the 8 laws of health and how these principles aid us in maintaining our health and preventing us from getting sick, in natural ways. The main highlight though was on the importance of sunlight and the benefits of vitamin D, and its role in helping us to maintain bone strength, regulating our blood pressure, in strengthening our immune system and the role sunshine plays in helping with depression. These were good facts that the audience appreciated.

So for this evening we had a packed menu, as our last demonstration was based on "Vegan Party Foods." We had a few chefs lined up for this evening – Br. Joe Voncina, Sr. Lidia Voncina, Sr. Rosetta Ilic & Sr. Tanya Ah-Ching,



so Br. Joe got us started off by demonstrating Spring Scrolls (Vegan Savoury Strudels) (Just simply amazing!), then followed by the other chefs demonstrating Potato Cheese (great on tacos etc), Sausage Rolls (who doesn't like a good sausage roll?!), Spelt Flour Spinach Tartlets, Vegan Vege-licious Wraps (its name says it all!), Black Bean Cups, Caramel Slice & Chia & Lime Pudding (both desserts were irresistibly awesome!). We did go just a bit over time on this evening's menu, but sometimes you just have to leave the audience with something that will keep them coming back for more. On this evening, we did have the most attendees out of this series with an attendance of about 55 happy people who were all so grateful to see the cooking demonstrations on again.

The people in attendance were also happy to explore our Elim Health Store after the conclusion of each evening with many of the necessary ingredients from each recipe that were available in-store being on everyone's shopping list to trial at home. It was also good to see some health book sales throughout the course of the demonstrations which we pray will be a blessing to those that made the purchases.


In saying all of this, it is also a sad time for the Elim Health Team, as this was the last series that Sr. Lidia Voncina would be in charge of. With Joe and Lidia's retirement looming at the end of 2022, this will also turn a new leaf for the Elim Health Team and for the cooking demonstrations to come. From humble beginnings about 20 years ago, Sr. Lidia was at the forefront of it all and was very committed to making these demonstrations go a long way, and we are so happy to see the changes and results of great work through the people that have been blessed along the way with the many recipes that have been demonstrated and especially helping many on their journey to good health. We don't believe this will be the last we will see of Sr. Lidia, as I am sure she won't be able to help herself and she will be back in one way or another to contribute to the many cooking demonstrations ahead of us, but we thank Sr. Lidia for paving the way, and we hope that those that will continue this great missionary outreach with the Elim Health Team can continue the great work in reaching out to the community through demonstrating the benefits of healthy living through delicious vegan cooking.

## **Baptism of Fuatino Marie Wily**

Sabbath 6<sup>th</sup> of August 2022 was a blissful Sabbath, not only because it was the one day in the week that we got to meet in God's presence and forget the worries and troubles of the past six days, but because of two other reasons. First, we woke up to the beautiful sun shining (which has been a very rare occurrence over the past few months here in Sydney). Second, we were going to welcome another lamb into God's fold through the waters of baptism.

It was a very happy day for Sister Fuatino Marie Wily, who resides in the Riverina town of Griffith, NSW. Marie was brought up in the SDA Reform Movement church, and it was always her mother's prayer that Marie (her only child) would one day give her heart to the Lord. But after some time of living out her life the way she wanted, she met Jerry, and eventually they got married and were waiting on the next phase in life, of becoming parents. For five years they waited and prayed for a child, and God answered their prayers, with their beautiful baby girl Eden, who was born at the beginning of this year.

During Marie's pregnancy, she and her husband had the opportunity to really consider the future of their unborn child. With so much happening in the world, their number one priority was to give this gift God had given them back to the Lord in such a way that she would grow to know and love God always. So, Marie started her journey by requesting baptismal Bible

studies with Brother Larry Ah-Ching. After completing her baptismal studies, Marie didn't want to wait too long. So she planned to head to Sydney for the baptism to be held on Sabbath August 6th, 2022.

But the devil was not at rest. He was adamant in not wanting Marie to get baptised. The day before they planned to head up to Sydney, their car decided to stop working, so they had a mechanic come to have a look at what was wrong. The mechanic told them it would take him until the following afternoon to try and fix the problem. They couldn't afford to wait until the following afternoon, as they needed to get to Sydney before Sabbath. At this point things were not going as planned, so they prayed for the Lord to help them work out what they should do, and above all they prayed that God's will in all of this be done. They decided to hire a car and packed up to leave for Sydney on Thursday evening.

Now another difficulty arose. Throughout the week leading up to August 6th, there was forecast heavy rainfalls in Southern NSW which affected the Riverina and surrounding areas. Sydney was



fortunate enough to have stayed dry, which was very much needed as we were just coming out of some major flooding from a few weeks earlier. By Thursday the rains had settled down in Southern NSW, but had left many roads in and out of the Riverina areas flooded. Now a trip that initially should have only taken about 6 or so hours ended up taking them all night. They only arrived in Sydney around 6am on

Friday morning. There were many roads cut off by water and a lot of detours that needed to be taken, and at some points they had to cross flooded roadways with a lot of faith, praying the car wouldn't get stuck. But all praise and glory to God because He is so merciful to His loved ones, and they made it by God's grace.

Sabbath started out with beautiful sunshine. Many were in attendance for Sabbath School and Divine Service which was followed by the Profession of Faith for Marie. All were very happy to hear her Christian experience and what had led her to decide to give her heart to the Lord.

During combined lunch the winds picked up and it got a little chillier than what the baptismal candidate and the church elder would have wanted, let alone everyone else that was going to be at the river.

We all headed out to be at the Yarramundi Reserve River in Richmond by 3pm and the Lord was so good that by the time we arrived at the river, the wind had disappeared. It was just a glorious sunny afternoon-perfect for a baptism (well, I am sure the water would have told a very different story). It was a beautiful start to a journey that all heaven is rejoicing in. Our prayer is that God will continue to bless Sister Marie as she continues to journey with the Lord each and every day, knowing that she will be in our prayers and have our full support in helping her grow in God's amazing grace.

# **East Timor Fundraising Tins**

After learning of the needs of the East Timor Mission, one of our sisters in Melbourne had the idea of getting some donation tins for people to take home as a modern equivalent of the "self-denial box."

The self-denial box was an initiative created by Seventh-day Adventists in the 1800s to raise money for missions. Members would have a self-denial box in their homes. Any time they were able to add spare change to it, they would. Sometimes this would mean doing without something that they were going to buy, and putting the money in the box instead, hence the "self-denial" part.

With a supply of donation tins secured, a label was printed with instructions on how to reach the web site for the East Timor Mission. The tins were spread all over Australia, and families took them home to have their own "self-denial box" experiment.


The tins that were distributed in Melbourne were collected by the Maranatha Church in late September, just before Luke and Anda Phillips returned to Timor. The contents of tins returned plus the donation box in the church foyer was counted by young volunteers and found to be \$1,859.45. What a success!

While on the way back to Timor, Sr Anda informed us that with other direct donations, including bank transfers, a total of \$16,439.72 had been raised for the East Timor Mission.



The work in East Timor is ongoing, and development of the property is still in need of funds. Please keep the mission in your prayers, and remember that work when you decide where to give your offerings.



We decided to try doing the same obstacle course again, this time with a backpack filled with a bag of sand. This helped the children understand how sin can weigh us down and make things more challenging for us. They were rewarded by finding some gemstones in the sand, which they got to keep.

In order to provide some time to cool down, the children experimented with some play dough for a while. We then demonstrated the Newtonian theory by trying to roll some logs uphill. This activity proved that a lot of force is required to stop the log from rolling down hill, and likewise it takes effort to resist temptation.

The last activity was a Tug of War. The children really put all their energy into it. Even though the sides were quite uneven, it was a tough challenge. Br Randy explained that when we face challenges bigger than we can handle, Jesus is there to help us. Br Markus then challenged one of the younger boys to a tug of war; who do



you think won? It looked like Br Markus would win, but all the other children decided to help their friend, and they won. Br Markus emphasised the importance of working together and helping each other so we can succeed.

The program was concluded with singing and prayer. We thank the Lord for the wonderful day and pray that He will bless the children and help them to love Him always and be willing to help others.

### 90 Years Young

On the occasion of her 90th birthday, two of Sr. Katarina Risko's daughters pay tribute to their mother.

Our mother, Katarina Risko, was born Katarina Lada on the 17th November 1932. She was one of seven children in the town of Vukovar/Borovo, Croatia, Yugoslavia.

She grew up during World War II and lived in Germany and Croatia. She took her stand for the Seventh Day Adventist truth in her mid-teens and was opposed, ridiculed and taunted for her beliefs in the workplace, but she stood firm to the Bible truth during the post-war years of Communism and Socialism. She met our father, Vaso Risko at a church Convention in Osijek, Croatia, and they married on the 7th of August, 1952. Branka (Brenda) was born in 1953 in Osijek, and then plans were made for the three of them to resettle somewhere,



either Canada or the USA, and they travelled to Italy and stayed in Trieste at a refugee camp while paperwork was being prepared. At this time, Zeljko (Jacob) was born in 1956, and they were granted visas to come to Australia. They travelled by sea to Australia in 1957

and were met in Sydney from the ship by the late Brother Haynes, who helped them find accommodation and work.

Life was busy with two young children, and our parents lived in Crystal Street, Petersham. Dad was a shoemaker by trade and opened his store-front business with a house where we lived at the back. Helen was born in November 1958 and Rosetta in





August 1961 in Sydney. The family moved to a little country cottage in Riverstone, which was an idyllic place to bring up the children, with a huge garden and creek, and was surrounded by rural properties. However. God had other plans. Our father was asked to join the church ministry, and he started to labour for the Lord as a Bible worker. We moved to Melbourne at this time,



which was in 1966 and 1967.

Mum was always industrious, working outside the home. She was a very organised and competent homemaker, as well as a loving mother. She would always accompany our father on evening Bible studies to people's homes, and often we children would tag along as well. In this way we all got to know lots of people who were interested in the truth.

The family was spreading its wings, and Brenda married Daniel Lalich in 1974 and moved to Canada. Their first child, Loretta, was born in 1978. In 1980 there were three family weddings: Rosetta to Danko in Metkovic, Serbia; Helen to Predrag in Melbourne, Victoria; and Jacob to Blanka in Sacramento, USA. It was a happy year, but also a sad time for Mum and Dad, as all the children had flown the coop, and they were left alone.

From 1980 until 1992 Mum and Dad lived in Perth, Western Australia, and Dad continued to spread the gospel there. Dad sadly suffered a heart-attack at this time. Mum and Dad moved back to Sydney, and they were blessed with a few more years together. Dad passed away on 17th March 1997, at the age of 66.

Mum has continued to be strong in the Lord, and although at times has had health concerns and struggles, she has found the Lord faithful. He continues to sustain her. She will often share her favourite saying with others – "The Lord looks after His own."

The family were blessed by coming together for our mother's 90th birthday to celebrate this milestone in her life. May God continue to bless and keep her strong in Him.



### **Voting Information**

#### **Our Stance**

The Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement teaches that we "cannot participate in any political plan" (Principles of Faith, 1925, number 20). This includes being members of a political party, advocating for or against party policies, and voting for party candidates in political elections.

However, this does not mean we should not exercise our vote on moral questions or those questions that determine laws that govern our nation. There may be laws of a constitutional nature where a referendum is conducted or where our direct viewpoint on an issue is called for via a plebiscite. In such cases our influence and vote should be cast on the side of morality and virtue.

The position of the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement does not specifically forbid a person to exercise their democratic right to cast a vote. Our focus is on the principles connected with involvement in politics and the agitation of political issues.

In Australia and New Zealand our people avoid voting in state and federal elections, due to the intrinsic conflict of principle created by the fact that these are political-party based. By involving ourselves in political plans, voicing our political opinions, or agitating for political parties or candidates, we yoke ourselves up "unequally with unbelievers" and threaten the harmony and unity that God wants to exist among His remnant people.

#### Failure to Vote

In Australia, voting is compulsory. Every eligible Australian is required by law to enrol and keep their enrolment details up to date.

If a person who is eligible to vote fails to vote at an election in Australia, they may receive a penalty notice for "Apparent failure to vote." For federal elections, the penalty is a \$20 fine, while states impose different penalty amounts.

The options on the notice are, to advise the returning officer where you voted, or if you have a valid and sufficient reason for failing to vote, to state that reason, or else pay the fine as per the notice.

#### Valid and Sufficient Reason

Subsection 245(14) of the Commonwealth Electoral Act, and section 13A of the Referendum Act, provides that "the fact that an elector believes it to be part of his or her religious duty to abstain from voting constitutes a valid and sufficient reason for failing to vote."

Members have often stated as reason for failure to vote that it was due to their "conscientious religious convictions."

#### Research and Assistance
