

Sometime ago a plan was formulated to have a "fly-build" project to erect a chapel in Samoa. The brethren there are very happy that this time has finally arrived! Unfortunately Br John Lausevic, director of the Welfare Department, is not able to carry this out due to some health problems, so Br Luke Kneebone was entrusted to take on this project.

On Sunday 9th June 2013 Br Luke, his wife Sr Jade and Josiah left Sydney for Samoa. Jade shared the following thoughts from their trip:

"Well we made it here safely. Flight went well, Josiah seems to love flying so that was good... unfortunately I forgot just how hot it actually gets over here. Poor little Josiah, he is constantly sweating, and I just can't manage to keep him cool! Village life is much different when you have a little baby, and things like keeping mozzies away become much more important... Luke has been busy trying to organise everything for the church building so they can start construction next week, so I haven't seen him much as he has been catching the bus into town everyday. But there are plenty of helpers here to help look after Josiah... Anyway for those of you who know the people from church here, all are well and excited that they will be getting a new church soon. Luke managed to get a data sim, so we will try to continue with the updates when possible. Love from Samoa - Luke, Jade and Josiah"

We are grateful and thankful to the Lord that "Stage 1" has now begun. Please pray for the success of this special project that it may be a blessing to the brethren there in Samoa; pray also that God will bless and give strength to all those who have sacrificed of their time and effort for the benefit of this work.

Another quote from Jade: "Br Alasdair Pow and Tim Wiseman arrived safely last night (18th June), but I think they are a bit stressed to see how much work actually needs to be accomplished in the next 10 days!"

Since then, Brother Madalin Duna also has gone over to Samoa to join the rest of the team and together with the Samoan brethren they are extremely busy levelling the ground, digging the trenches and preparing the steel for the foundations of the chapel.

Quote from Jade - Thursday 21 June 2013: "We are all still well over here in the land of Samoa! Construction is progressing slowly, but getting there, in Island time."

Brother Matthias Thiel also joined them on Sunday 23 June and will be building a retaining wall and also helping with the concreting. God willing, the concrete will be poured on Wednesday 26th June 2013, making it all ready for "Stage 2" which will be taking place sometime in September this year.

Update Monday 24 June 2013: "Hi all from Samoa. Just thought I'd fill you in on our weekend over here. We all had a lovely Sabbath. Thanks to the Samoan government the guys can't work before 8am or after 6pm, and are not allowed to work on Sundays. So we all had a lovely weekend, and managed to be tourists for half a day on Sunday! It was the first time any of us got a swim here in Samoa this trip. Josiah absolutely loved the water! Brother Matthias Thiel arrived last night from New Zealand and today work continues on the site although they are quite stressed as the work is progressing a bit slower than wished. Today they are working in the rain. Luke had to run into town again, so I am spending my 6 year wedding anniversary without him Oh well never mind. Only 1½ weeks to go and we'll be coming back to freezing Sydney lol and then I'll probably wish I was back here hahaha!!"

I was tempted to fly back with the others this morning, but decided that I might as well stay for the last week and keep my husband company. Anyway, that's all for now. Better try and get some sleep!"

London Project Update



Many greetings to all of you in Christ Jesus. It is with great joy and enthusiasm that we inform you of our arrival in London and of the commencement of this evangelistic outreach which many of us have long been looking forward to. We thank the Lord for His graciousness in allowing us all to arrive here safely and for the privilege of being able to take part in this project which, in actuality, is much more than a project—it is a solemn mission and a rewarding work! What a wonderful blessing it is to have been given the opportunity to labor alongside other God-fearing youth in His vineyard in a foreign land, bringing the truth to a place where its beacon has not yet, for some time, been able to shine in all its brightness. While we are fully aware of the challenge that awaits us, and while we know discouragements and difficulties will at times be hurled our way, we also know and remember that we are not alone in this mission we have undertaken. He who protected, guided, and strengthened the prophets of old as well as our faithful forefathers, will be beside us every step of the way to grant us divine assistance and courage.

As I'm sure some of you know, this project was not without its share of setbacks and obstacles which had to, with God's help, be overcome. These were not only on the field level but also on a personal level, for many of us. But by God's grace, we have made it here and at the moment we are twenty-one strong, anxiously awaiting the arrival of six more canvassers who will be arriving from Hungary and Spain tomorrow

as well as three more individuals from France next week. We realize that the enemy has been trying his hardest to discourage us and halt the Lord's work by flooding us with difficulties and complications. But this only proves that a great work is to be done here in the next months, provoking fierce oppositions from the powers of darkness.

Today we had our very first canvassing experience which was quite encouraging and exciting. After only a few hours of canvassing, we sold a total of thirty-eight books including two More Choices, one Bible Heroes, and thirty-five Happiness Digest (Steps to Christ), which earned us a total of 51 pounds and 21 pence. It was beautiful to be able to get a taste of reaching out to others in this way, especially for those of us who did it for the very first time. We ask that you pray for us so that today may have been only the first of many such wonderful experiences and that with God's help we may be able to do our utmost best in this sacred commission that He has entrusted to us as His sons and daughters.

Lessons in the School of Grace: The Fruit of Salvation

A question was raised recently in a Bible discussion group that I am a member of concerning the nature and role of obedience, or "good works", in the Christian experience. What relationship do they have, if any, to our salvation? As you might imagine, a quite lively discussion ensued.

One member of the group stated, "Salvation, if real, leads to works of obedience by faith. If obedient works do not exist – or willful rebellion to God's commandments does exist – then the grace He so wilfully offered was rejected."

A detractor retorted, "The thief on the cross did not have time to perfect his life even in faith as you suggest. If you could find some grace to go with your package it would make more sense."

If the thief on the cross was assured of salvation, simply by his declaration of faith in Christ, then is it any different for us?

Ephesians 2:8-9 is emphatic: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, 9 not of works, lest anyone should boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9.)

This is a powerful verse that emphasises the fact that our salvation is wholly of grace. But what place do works have in this package, if any?

In Paul's letter to Titus we find an answer. Here Paul defines saving grace not by what it is, but by what it does.

"For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world." (Titus 2:11-12.)

Saving grace is an educator and its lesson is a very practical one. In this world today, with all its sin and decadence, grace teaches believers that they are to deny sin in all its forms and "live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives" (ESV).

Grace also teaches us to keep "looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ." It reminds us that Jesus gave Himself for us, for a reason—"that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works." (Titus 2:13-14.)

Note the outcome of this lesson. Those who enter the school of grace become purified believers who are zealous of good works.

Ephesians 2:9 makes it clear that any assurance of salvation or acceptance with God does not rest on our works. Our salvation is by grace alone through faith. It is a gift of God, not gained by anything we have done for God, but in what God has done for us in Christ. If our salvation were dependent on our good works, some might have a reason to boast. But the apostle makes it clear here, that there is no room for boasting. Any "good works" that we do are simply the product of God's work in us. The next verse in the passage makes this point very clear.

"For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10)

As sinners, we have nothing worthy to bring to God. In fact we can do nothing to merit ourselves to Him. He alone chose to save us, "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us..." Note now how this was accomplished. "...by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5).

Unless we have experienced this regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit, we are not in a saving relationship with God nor are we able to work any good work He has ordained for us. The reason He recreates us anew in Christ is so that we CAN do good works. Before we even knew God, He already ordained a life of good works for us. More than that He draws us, calls us, converts us, and renews us so that "we should walk in them." Such a life of good works then is merely the fruit of our faith, not the root of it. A Christian life in which there is a zeal for good works—where there is denial of self and sin, and an active life of godliness—are simply the fruit of God's grace alone working in the heart of the believer. For this reason, as Jesus affirmed, much fruit (the good works of our redeemed lives) glorifies our Father in heaven (Matt 5:16; John 15:8).

A life of grace is a life of growth—"first the blade, then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear" (Mark 4:28). When the thief on the cross confessed Christ as his saviour, he manifested the springing up of God's grace in his heart. His life was but a blade. He had no further opportunity to glorify God. But we, who are called to live godly lives in this world, are to "go on unto perfection" (Hebrews 6:1). We are to grow in grace, letting our life manifest not only the "blade", but also the "ear, and after that, the full corn in the ear" (Mark 4:28). The thief's life of grace constituted but a few hours. Ours may constitute a number of years. In either case, our assurance of salvation lies not in any works of righteousness that we have done, but solely in the grace of God.

To illustrate further the relationship of works to our life, consider the beautiful symbol of the branches and the vine, as applied by Jesus. In the passage found in John 15, Jesus states that He is the vine. Believers are the branches. Our Father in heaven is the Caretaker of the vine.

If a branch bears fruit ("good works"), it is purged (through tests and trials) by the Caretaker, in order that it may bring forth more fruit. Furthermore, any branch that does not bear fruit is cut off. Meditate on this for a moment. The only purpose of the branch is to bear fruit. This is our reason for being, our reason for living—to glorify our Father in heaven in joyful response to His saving work for us and within us. But how do we go about bearing fruit? Do we try to produce the fruit ourselves? Or do we trust God to take care of the fruitfulness of the branches?

If we are trying to bear fruit, with our focus on ourselves, we will be making a sad mistake. A great many of the ancient Jews made this mistake. When it came to efforts to "bear fruit", they were indeed a zealous people. Their efforts to "keep" the law of God, was second to none. However, all their efforts to maintain "good" works amounted to nothing. As the apostle Paul put it, they had a zeal, but not according to knowledge. What knowledge were they ignorant of?

Paul explains the problem in Romans 10:3, "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God."

In trying to establish their own righteousness they failed to not only submit to God's righteousness, but were entirely ignorant of it. The kind of righteousness that God requires was a righteousness that surpassed human standards. Not only in outward conduct, but in the inner mind and heart of a person, God required perfect conformity to His will. Only one person who has ever walked this earth manifested that kind of righteousness in every thought and act of His life. That person was Jesus Christ. His righteousness alone could meet the demands of God. And in giving up our own righteousness, and submitting to this righteousness we find acceptance with God.

In going about to establish our own righteousness, trying to make ourselves a "better" Christian, we are really operating as those ancient Jews were. They were so focused on complying with the letter of the law that they forgot the weightier matters, "justice, mercy and the love of God."

The only way to come into possession of this kind of righteousness is through confession and belief:

"...If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." (Romans 10:9-10.)

Such a confession and belief, rooted in our hearts, requires submission of our own will and way to God's will and way. In taking a lesson from the vine and the branch, it is evident that no amount of worrying can produce one ounce of fruit. If the branch simply rests in the vine, allowing the life of the vine to flow through the branch, there will be life, growth and fruitfulness—naturally. This is the life of faith.

The ancient Jews who failed to exercise such faith became fruitless branches, despite their efforts to bear fruit. Consequently they were cut off. But other branches were grafted in by faith. Using the figure of an olive tree, the apostle Paul exhorts believers:

"Do not be arrogant toward the branches. If you are, remember it is not you who support the root, but the root that supports you. Then you will say, 'Branches were broken off so that I might be grafted in.' That is true. They were broken off because of their unbelief, but you stand fast through faith. So do not become proud, but fear. For if God did not spare the natural branches, neither will he spare you.

"Note then the kindness and the severity of God: severity toward those who have fallen, but God's kindness to you, provided you continue in his kindness. Otherwise you too will be cut off." (Romans 11: 18-22 (ESV))

Continuing in God's kindness, or goodness (as the KJV renders the word), requires the continual exercise of belief—a belief that manifests itself in fruit bearing. The Greek word for "believe $(\pi\iota\sigma\tau\epsilon\dot{\nu}\omega)$ (pisteuo) means, not just to have a merely intellectual belief that something is true, but to trust, to put faith in, to rely on, to be persuaded of, to have confidence in. All this implies an active, abiding faith in Christ, a "faith which works by love" (Galatians 5:6). Such a relationship will indeed be fruitful.

But remember, the secret to fruit bearing is not to try to bear fruit. The secret is simply to abide. John 15:5, "Abide in me and I in you" Christ said. We are to be IN Christ, and He is to be IN us. This requires continual self-surrender. The branch has nothing to give but itself and depends solely on the vine for everything. Life and fruitfulness is promised to the branch that abides. It is a relationship of absolute trust.

For Christ to be in us, it requires an intimate and unbroken connection with Him. This calls for us to deny ourselves and give up anything that would interrupt our connection with Him in obedience to the Word of God (John 15:3). It calls for a continual trust in Him for everything, exercising constantly the faith He gives to us for without Him we can do nothing (John 15:5). It calls for constant communion with Him through prayer, praise, and thanksgiving. It calls for meditation in His word, listening for His voice speaking to our hearts.

As we abide in the vine, "the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5) continues. This washing cleanses us from "all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). Bad fruit is removed and good fruit buds and blossoms. This process involves the Holy Spirit imparting a new heart to us—new desires, new purposes, and new motives. This change of heart leads to a change of behaviour in our life.

What God does with this heart is outlined in Hebrews 8:10-12. "I will put my laws into their minds and write them in their hearts." That is, the principles of God's laws—to love Him with all our heart, and our neighbour as ourself—will be fulfilled in us.

Just as Christ, foreshadowed in Psalm 40:8, could say, "I delight to do thy will, Oh my God, yea they law is within my heart!" so will every believer who has Christ within, also declare the same words, "I delight to do thy will, Oh my God, yea thy law is within my heart"—written there by the Holy Spirit!

As the apostle Paul wrote,

"Wherefore, my beloved, as ye have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. (2:13) For it is God which worketh in you both to will and to do of [his] good pleasure." (Philippians 2:12-13)

God works in us BOTH to WILL and to DO of His good pleasure. It is God that wills us to do In saying that, is there nothing that we are to do? The fact that all through Scripture believers are told "to hold our confidence sure", "to reckon ourselves dead", "to submit", "to come", "to abide", "to work out", "to deny", "to stand", "to put on", "to fight", "to pray", "to persevere", etc, implies that we have much to do. But all

this doing will come naturally to us as we do one simple thing: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved!" (Acts 16:31)

As the figure of the branch and the vine illustrate, fruit bearing is the sign of a living healthy connection with the vine.

Taking the analogy of fruit bearing further, in another place Jesus, likens people to trees. Each tree will be known by its fruit. Good fruit indicates a healthy tree. Corrupt fruit indicates a diseased tree.

"A good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is good; and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is evil" (Luke 6:45).

When it comes to the fruits of our life, our works will bear witness to the soundness of our Christian experience. If we are producing "evil" fruit, it is a sure sign we have fallen from grace. Our life, instead of being a fruitful walk in the Spirit, becomes a hedonistic walk in the flesh.

"Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are [these]; Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told [you] in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God.


"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against such there is no law. And they that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts." (Galatians 5:19-24.)

Diligent students of grace learn its lesson well. The only way we can be saved is by grace alone through faith in Christ. But that grace teaches us that if we belong to Christ, our old life, lived in the flesh is now to be crucified with Him. By constantly reckoning ourselves "dead indeed unto sin but alive unto God through Jesus Christ" (Romans 6:11) we are in a position to live godly, spirit filled lives, zealous of good works. In so doing, it is my prayer that we may all become glorious fruit laden branches, the product of the Lord's planting, the fruit of the grace He abundantly bestowed upon us when he "saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost."

Remembering the Life of Br Paul Voncina


Paul Voncina was born in Mitrovac Croatia on the 27th June 1935 to Antonia and Rudolf Voncina. Paul was the youngest of 13 children; he was amongst 6 brothers and 7 sisters. His early years were spent going to school, working on the family farm and later joining his father and brothers who were working the forestry industry.

In 1957 Paul went to Germany where he worked in the mines for one and a half years. In 1959, at the age of 24, seeking a better life, Paul migrated to Australia.

On the 25th September 1960, Brother Paul Voncina was baptized by Pastor Charles Peter Haynes at Lane Cove River and became a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement church. In the same year Paul married Mira Jaksic who came to Australia to be his wife.

Paul's first job in Australia was at the Holden car manufacturing plant. After that he worked many years at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital as a handy man and laundry hand.

Robert their only son, was born on 25 May 1970 and they spent many happy years enjoying nature, going to parks, feeding birds, going to the beach, playing soccer and cricket; Paul also enjoyed teaching Robert how to ride a bike. One of the things Paul took much pleasure in was helping Robert with school woodwork projects; they made model boats and even a working guitar; Paul was very good with his hands.



One of Paul's great enjoyments in life was playing the organ at home. He never had music lessons but taught himself how to play the organ so whenever he had any spare time he would sit and play his organ.

Sadly, Paul suffered a terrible work accident in 1977, during which he lost his right arm; his life was very much affected from that time on.

One of the happy moments of Paul's life was in 1979 when he was able to go back to visit Croatia and Serbia with his son Robert to visit the family and do some sightseeing. This was the first time that Paul went back since he had left his homeland.

After his terrible accident Paul chose to move out from his home and live alone, a very private and peaceful life. Even during these years, Paul never gave up his Advent beliefs of awaiting the return of his dear Saviour Jesus Christ.

Early 2003, quite often Paul used to turn up at the AUC Union office and ask for tracts so he could letter box; he still had zeal for missionary work and wanted to spread the good news. Sometimes when out of tracts, he would be quite sad and say: "How could you run out, I need to go and spread the message".

On Sabbath the 20th April 2013 at the age of 77, Paul was found in his unit where he had fallen peacefully asleep in Jesus.

To Mira, Robert, Svetlana, relatives, Paul has fallen asleep but the wonderful memories live on and as you reflect on his life you will remember these precious years that you spent knowing him, living with him and being with him.

Be comforted with these words ... "the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17.
